Tonight you will see we have made significant changes to the format of the Annual Town Meeting. We have placed a greater emphasis on the key events that have occurred this past year, whilst continuing to celebrate the wonderful people that live and work in our community. This special edition of CrossTalk contains reports from the Chairman of each committee which covers the main work of the Town Council.

Last year I mentioned that the Town Council continues to "step in", indeed this year we have "stepped up". We are undertaking the greatest period of investment in our history. The purchase of the former NatWest building will enable the council to have a strategic stake in the future of the High Street whilst providing a long-term income stream. This coupled with the Community Centre refurbishment, which will include a brand new café and function room, will continue to protect and enhance our community assets.

Movies in the Park kicks off a week-long of Festival celebrations, (June 29th - July 6th) which I am confident will deliver our best festival to date. Our brand new quarterly Farmers Market begins on the 18th May with a host of excellent local producers and the first outing of our mobile demonstration kitchen. Located around the Market House, this will be one event not to miss.

The highest honour from the Town Council, the Citizens Award, has been joined by new awards this year. Community groups give so much to the vitality and diversity of this town and we want to recognise their crucial work with our Community Group Award. As part of the Town Council agenda of promoting the role of business and supporting our High Street, we have created a Business of the Year Award. Finally, we wanted to recognise the role of our Young Citizens; the future of our community and with the calibre

we received in nominations, I strongly believe our best days are ahead of us.

I would like to thank everyone for their commitment this year. We have faced many challenges and dealt with them as a team together. I often mention that the Town Council 'punches above its weight' and I think our successes this year continue to reflect that. I would also like to thank Annabelle Denbury for her efforts in organising tonight's meeting.

We welcome your feedback on tonight and indeed any town matters.

Finance Committee Report

The financial year 2018–2019 saw continuing pressures on the Town Council service provision, with rising inflation and a further cut in the Government's Council Tax Support Grant amongst the challenges faced. However, the Town Council's long term policy of financial prudence and efficiency savings, linked with investing income to generate future prosperity for the community still enabled us to:

- Invest in our staff through training, equipment and remuneration.
- Complete the restoration of the Market House.
- Continue management of our weekly Charter Market.
- Build on the success of the summer Festival and Xmas Lights event.
- Put plans in place for our forthcoming Food Markets.
- Work closely with our Local Government partners on the Local Plan.
- Prepare for the switch to a Unitary Authority.
- Invest in the Town Centre to keep it the vibrant heart of our community.
- Issue numerous small grants to local groups and organisations.
- Contain the increase to the precept to 1.98%.

All this and of course keeping on track with maintaining our glorious parks, Stratton Memorial Garden and much more.

Whilst in comparison to some of the larger Town/Parish Councils (Sutton Coldfield, the largest in the Country, has an electorate of 75,000 and a precept of £1.8 M) our relatively small precept, wisely budgeted, still enables us to not only offer good value for money, but also to "punch well above our weight".

The Town Council will continue to manage its finances efficiently and in accordance with Government regulation and probity whilst seeking to provide an excellent service to you, the community. The Annual Accounts are available to view and I can also confirm that the Charities accounts have been received.

The Town Council currently recognised as Quality Council, has submitted its application for Quality Gold Award which is deemed to be the highest ranking for our sector. We should hear about this later in the year.

Town Committee Report 2018/2019

This has been a very busy year for the committee, which meets every month, with various major and minor projects coming on line.

The committee oversees the actions of the in-house Maintenance Team, who perform many and varied tasks for the Council, such as grass cutting, building maintenance and general grounds maintenance.

Over the past year this team has worked extremely hard to maintain the quality of the flower beds around the town and due to the very warm summer had a hard time to ensure that the beds were sufficiently watered, and dead headed to ensure that they always looked at their best.

It will soon be time to put in the summer bedding and we will endeavour to ensure that the beds are kept looking their best regardless of what weather we get.

The team are also heavily involved in our Devolved Services programme, whereby we provide grass cutting and grounds maintenance to other councils and authorities which brings in a very valuable finance stream which helps to keep our in- house maintenance costs down.

To continue to provide an efficient and effective service we will also invest in some new equipment that will enable the team to complete their grass cuts in a shorter time, which will free them up for other essential work.

The committee is very appreciative of all the work that this team does over the course of the year and the high standards that they maintain in all they do.

A major project that is now well underway and due for completion by the end of April is the rolling programme of replacing most of our old sodium type street lighting stock with new energy efficient LED heads which are both brighter and use much less energy.

We took some time to identify a supplier and the correct equipment and following successful trials in various parts of the town the roll out is now in progress, due for completion at the end of April.

The committee is grateful for the hard work done by the LED Lighting sub-committee who have taken the brunt of the work leading up to this point.

When we were informed, by a councillor, about the Silent Soldier concept to recognise the 100th anniversary of the end of World War 1 we embraced the project and together with the RBL local branch, purchased and installed a number of silhouettes in and around the town. In addition to the Silent Soldier project the Town Council held a Beacon Lighting Service at Stratton Memorial Garden. It was a wonderful, well attended event to commemorate the end of The Great War.

It is also worth noting that we have 're-turfed' the Poppy Cross on Duke Street Gardens with AstroTurf as it was becoming difficult to maintain real grass in this area and now the Cross will look good all year round, even if we suffer a long hot summer as per last year.

During the autumn we installed a Youth Shelter in the King George V park which had been a request from a group of young people who use the skate park there. Unfortunately, this was vandalised by fire shortly after, but the culprits were known and dealt with by the police.

For those of you who regularly cycle, you will be pleased, no doubt, to see that a free to use electrical bicycle tyre pump has been installed in the Market Square. This was fully funded from external sources and is an example of co-operation between local authorities and outside organisations.

We have both monthly and quarterly inspections of all of our play equipment and as such we can deal with any maintenance/damage issues as they arise. *continued overleaf...*



Town Committee Report 2018/2019

In our close co-operation with Risborough Rangers Junior Football Club (RRJFC) we were able to allow access to St. Dunstan's Park on a regular basis for training and are in the process of installing a shed on the Earle Mitchell Ground (also known as Tenants) to store RRJFC's essential grounds equipment. The 'pavilion' on that field is in a state of disrepair and as such we have decided to take it out of use until we have the time and finance available to refurbish.

We have introduced a 'Severe Weather Policy' in relation to the operation of the Thursday Market. The market continues to flourish, and we are constantly getting enquiries asking for either a temporary or permanent pitch.

The committee has close liaison with the Risborough Environmental Group (REG), and we receive regular updates on the work that this fine organisation does.

The committee has decided on the planning and installation of a Communal Garden in the Stratton Memorial Ground, as somewhere where the beauty of the SMG can be seen along with our views across to the Whiteleaf Cross and this garden should enhance the tranquillity of the site and provide another focal point for flowers in the town that can be access by all.

As in all years the committee strives to provide a cost effective and efficient service to the community and to come in on budget regardless of what surprises come up.
