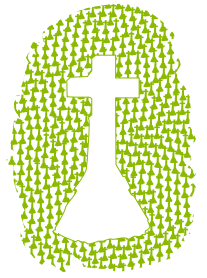

Message from the Mayor

The days have finally grown cooler, the nights are drawing in and what a wonderful action packed summer it's been. The week long annual Town Festival that took place at the beginning of July was a huge success, and I'm sure those of you that attended Festival Day on the High St will agree that the along with the new food court area this year, the addition of the big screen to watch England triumph through to the semi-finals only added to the atmosphere and made it a festival to remember.

The Town Council is thrilled to be organising an outdoor Movie event in association with Churchill Retirement Living for all the community to enjoy on the 22nd September. This will take place at King George V Recreation park, where there will also be food and drink available. We hope that by showing two family friendly movies (Moana and The Greatest Showman) we will see lots of you there throughout the day and evening. Tickets can be purchased via Eventbrite and you will find full details of these on our Facebook page and Town Council website.

In other news, I was recently was asked to 'turn the first sod' on the development of the Summerley Business Centre next to Ercol. I was very pleased to hear the interest that this new development is generating. These new units will bring new jobs and opportunities to Risborough which is great news for the town.

The Town Council has recently made representations to the Inspector to ensure that commitments made by Wycombe District Council will be met in a timely manner. The hearing for Risborough did not manage to cover all the points that the Inspector had raised and the remaining issues will be covered at an additional hearing on Wednesday 26th September. I will provide a detailed report in the next issue.

I can assure you that we are continuing development work in all areas, notably economic regeneration and the new sports facilities, and I hope we can provide a comprehensive update in the next edition. As ever please do not hesitate to contact us if you wish to discuss this in more detail.

The Secretary of State will be deciding on the Unitary situation shortly. Risborough is currently served by three Councils, Buckinghamshire County Council (BCC)(Education, Roads and Social Services), Wycombe District Council (WDC) (Planning, Bin Collections and Housing) and finally the Town Council. Both BCC and WDC agree that the current structure with three councils needs to change and agree that there must be a reduction to two councils - a new entity replacing BCC and WDC and the Town Council remaining in its current form. Where BCC and WDC diverge in views is the geographical reach. BCC envisions one council covering the whole county whilst WDC and the other District Councils have proposed two. Aylesbury Vale in the North and the South (including Risborough) covering the rest of the County.

Along with dedicated and professional staff delivering our vision we are in a strong position for the challenges ahead.

Town Council helps fund local projects

Each financial year the Town Council sets aside a portion of its budget to help local non-profit organizations or charities fund projects which are in the interest of the town for the benefit of all or some Risborough residents.

The Town Council has two different types of grant which local organizations can apply for, minor grants of up to £250 and major grants of amounts over £250. Each grant application is judged based on its own merit and agreed by the full council following a recommendation from the finance committee. Major grants are decided annually at our November Estimates meeting so the deadline is October. Please contact the office for further details.

One example of a major grant which was recently granted is that of £1000 which was granted to the Chinnor and Risborough Railway (CPRR) this Spring. The Chinnor and Risborough Railway Association was formed in the late 1980s following the closure of the Chinnor Cement Works and the railway line that was used between Chinnor and Princes Risborough with the aim of preserving the line between Chinnor and Risborough. Its aim was achieved in part when the association was able to take possession of the line in phases up as far as Thame Junction in 1996.

Following a slight delay, of about 20 years, the Chinnor and Risborough Railway recently came to an agreement with Network Rail allowing them access to the tracks between Thame Junction and Princes Risborough and to the old platform 4. Work began on rebuilding Platform 4 and on 15th August 2018 the Chinnor and Risborough Railway re-started passenger services between Princes Risborough and Chinnor. The rebuilding of the platform and the continuing refurbishment of the signal box has been done through grants, donations and lots of hard work by the CPRR volunteers.

Steve Growcott, one of the members of the CPRR association and a key leader of the current project said "Completion of Platform 4 at Princes Risborough marks a major milestone for the Association and its supporters". However the work is not yet finished and the refurbishment of the signal box continues with a long term ambition to open this to the public.

The Mayor, Cllr Walsh, and I were present for the first passenger service between Chinnor and Princes Risborough and it was great to see how grant money from PRTC can contribute to these projects which really do bring a benefit to the community as a whole. The money from the Town Council grant helped to fund the new signage on platform 4, which was crafted by Chinnor volunteers, and the new ticket booth which used to be a car park booth at Solihull!

THE SILENT SOLDIER

Commemorating 100 years since the end of the Great War



2018 is the year in which nations around the world mark the centenary of the armistice which saw the ending of the Great War, also known as the First World War. The Great War was a bloody conflict which started following the assassination of Austrian Archduke Franz Ferdinand in Sarajevo and then ended 4 years later with the 1918 armistice and then the 1919 Treaty of Versailles but only following the death of around 17 million people from both sides. Looking at history it is noticeable the effect that the Great War has had on this nation and indeed the world. Not only was a generation scarred by war but the geopolitical fallout lasts up until this day.

It is important that as a town we mark this commemoration in a suitable way, so that we remind ourselves as well as educate young people about the sacrifices of the past.

As part of this commemoration, the Town Council has purchased a 'Silent Soldier' silhouette. These silhouettes are appearing up and down the country and are being put into places as a commemoration of the centenary. Whilst the local Royal British Legion will be purchasing several silhouettes to be placed in fixed locations throughout the town, the Council's Silent Soldier will be touring around the town. Our silhouette will be able to visit local organisations, youth groups and schools so that everyone can participate in the commemoration. Also this year other commemorations are planned both in Princes Risborough and across Buckinghamshire to mark the centenary. More information will be distributed in future editions of Crosstalk, on our website and on Twitter once the plans are finalised.

Princes Risborough Charity

This charity was set up in March 1823 with the aim of providing the poor or elderly of the ancient parish of Princes Risborough with money for fuel or benefit of the same. The charity is administered by seven trustees, who meet at least twice a year and provide Christmas hampers and financial assistance for the less fortunate among us.

The charity provided over 20 such hampers last Christmas and, latterly, provided financial support, along with other parish charities, to a parishioner who needed help to purchase a powered wheelchair.

The charity derives its money from the rental of agricultural land in the area and the allotments in Bar Lane Longwick. The trustees are always on the lookout for persons that are entitled to receive either a Christmas hamper or financial support. Did you know the British Transplant Games was founded in 1978 by Maurice Slapack, Consultant Surgeon, who brought together his patients and other transplant recipients to hold the first Transplant Games in Portsmouth. Since then, Transplant Sport has grown to become the largest national charity promoting activity post-transplant and the organ donor register. We are very proud to announce that two residents of Risborough were triumphant at the games. Many of you will know Trevor Lynch (Risborough Runners). Trevor was diagnosed with Lymphoma in January 2012. Over the past six years he received a lot of intense treatment including two bone marrow transplants, the most recent of which was in 2016 when he received stem cells from a donor. This qualified him to take part in this year's British Transplant Games - something he set his sights on during his transplant.

Trevor took part in the 5k and 1500 metres events coming second in the 5k and third in the 1500 metres. Trevor was joined by another Risborough resident, Sean Walsh, who manages the Risborough Rangers under 11 football team and came second in football and third in the 100 metre sprint. Two local examples of life after treatment and successful organ donation! From us all at the Town Council, huge congratulations.
